

"Goodbye" Is Not Forever

So, how does a pastor say "goodbye?" It's a very hard thing to do, even if you've only been with your flock a little while. I suppose the two years you and I have been together is sort of in the middle – enough time to make some powerful friendships, but not long enough that parting seems like the end of the world. It's not easy, but since we know God is a part of the parting, it becomes bearable.

I'm struck by how Paul ends every one of his letters. (By the way, Hebrews is not one of Paul's letters. Scholars agree on this.) He offers things for the believers to do to help themselves in their Christian growth, then he offers encouragement and prayers for his audience. In just about every one of his letters, he talks about when he will see his readers again. We know that often, he did see them further on down the road.

In our modern Presbyterian system, when a pastor moves on and the relationship with the congregation is dissolved, the departing pastor is bound by the rules NOT to come back and minister in any way to his former church. It's

a sad reality that some pastors can't let go, and they interfere with the work of their successor. Some people see this as a flaw in our system. But think about Jesus! He did leave, finally, after his 40 days of post-resurrection teaching time with his disciples. He never did return as Jesus to them. And they were afraid when they knew. But in John 14, Jesus said some things that enabled them to carry on. "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not let them be afraid." (v. 27) God would provide them with an "Advocate," which also means counselor and teacher; he did! That was the Holy Spirit. That Spirit is still with you, and me, and all of us, today. It's a clear sign that no matter what our transitions in life, God is with us, to help us through. Jesus meant it when he said, "I do not give to you as the world gives." All the world can do is supply you some preachers, or another pastor. The gift of the Spirit that Jesus has given us exceeds those things the world can give. That's why you can let your hearts remain untroubled, and your souls unafraid. God has you! That means that you're not done, not by a long shot. So I'm going from this church, so there is unfinished work to do, so what? God is not done with you. You've been through too many things, overcome too many hurdles, to just give up. Paul would tell you to keep listening for God, and keep being awake to what God might be trying to say. I'm nowhere near Paul, but I say the same things. This is a sad time, sure, but it might be the beginning of some good times to come. I thank you for two years of great friendships, amazing times together, and incredible learning. May God continue to bless you for all you are, and all you will become. And we will someday meet again...

were elected to serve on the Pastor Covenant I Search Committee.


Next meeting will be March 15, 2016.




